

Dear Friends,

Many of you ask what our lives are like now that our retreat centers are closed. Our Sisters live independently in apartments or in communities in places where we once had retreat centers. I will speak a bit about our lives in what is called the Village. Nine of us live in the Resurrection Village in Chicago. This is a large senior citizen complex of five buildings housing four hundred residents. It was originally built by the Resurrection Sisters who also built a nearby hospital and high school to serve the families in the area.



What is it like to live here? The Village is a friendly, welcoming residential home. There are a few couples, but most women and men are singles. Most of us live in one-bedroom apartments. The main meal of the day is provided in a common dining room or folks can take the meal to their apartments. Each apartment has a kitchenette to prepare other meals. Each has a stove and a sink and refrigerator. There is a simple chapel designed to accommodate walkers and wheelchairs. Four days a week we have Mass at 8:00 a.m. For Sunday we have a vigil Mass and one on Sunday morning. There are special study groups, grief groups, and fun activities. There are seasonal parties, musical evenings, bus trips to grocery stores and various Chicago restaurants and shops. The grounds are large and made for walking, reading, or visiting.

What about what we have always called "our Cenacle life"? There are many things we miss and are finding different expressions of cherished values. We know we are fortunate to have daily Mass. It is amazing to see the impact of a smile or a simple greeting. We gather on Saturday afternoons for 'lectio' prayer. We prepare the readings for Sunday and take turns leading the prayer. We faith share; we pray for those who have asked for our prayers each week and check in with each other. We have come to cherish this time. Our life is semi-retired, most of us say. We no longer have major responsibilities. We have time for solitude, time to contemplate eternity, and time for plenty of province and congregational meetings thanks to Zoom. Right now, we are having a series of generational meetings with those who are in our age group in all of our provinces in our various countries. We are meeting people we have not had an opportunity to meet before. We are considering questions our entire order needs to consider for the future.

What about ministry you ask? Many of us can continue to talk with some people in Chicago or via Zoom. The great high seasons of Advent, Christmas, and Epiphany are located in our rearview mirrors. Lent will soon ask us to accompany Jesus as He shows how completely He embraces human life.

So we are located in ordinary time. In our weather news each evening our forecasters tell us how much new light increases each day. As we look around our entire, suffering world, we don't see light increase each day and wonder if wars will continue to escalate. Our American political scene remains contentious and will likely increase as the general election nears. We understand the intensity of the psalms and prayers in the scriptures. We have four hundred neighbors and can be sure some are lonely, are having a bad day, or are unwell. Small gestures are greatly appreciated.

This year we will spend our Sundays in Mark's Gospel. Bonnie Thurston, a poet and scripture scholar comments that Mark's world was similar to our current world. Both are worlds of conflict, of suffering, of common folk, of many deserts where God bends down and cares for people directly. For God to work, all of us need to ask for God's saving help for ourselves and our world diligently.

Let us join together in prayer. If you come to Chicago, stop in to see us at the Village.
